Council adopts its 2019/20 Budget

On 15 August 2019 Council adopted its 2019/20 budget.

Rates for 2019/20 are budgeted to be \$4,667,928 which represents 30.3% of budgeted revenue with operating grants (10.5%), capital grants (21.0%), transfers from reserve accounts (9.5%) and revenue from fees and charges (10.8%) also being significant funding sources.

Set out below is a summary of funding for some of the key features of the budget.

Community Bus available for hire

The Shire's Community Bus 'Miss Rosie' is available for hire by community groups, businesses and individuals for journeys around the south-west and beyond. The bus seats 20 including the driver.

The driver must hold a minimum current LR driver's licence – however an F-endorsed licence is required if the driver is transporting school children or receiving a reward for driving.

New disabled parking bay

A new ACROD disabled parking bay now exists in the space next to the solicitor's office on Hampton Street – alongside the entry ramp into the car park behind IGA.

Works will be completed shortly on another ACROD disabled parking bay on the lower level of the Civic Centre car park – close to the side/rear door of the civic centre.

Two existing ACROD parking bays are located in the railway car park with access to the car park from Spencer Street.

ACROD parking bays provide the required space to allow people with a disability to easily alight and board a vehicle.

To legally park in an ACROD bay a person must display an ACROD Parking Permit. The application form for a permit can be downloaded at www.acrod.ora.au

To be eligible for an ACROD Parking Permit you must meet one of the following criteria:

- You are unable to walk and always require the use of a wheelchair;
- Your ability to walk is severely restricted by a permanent medical condition or disability; or
- Your ability to walk is severely restricted by a temporary medical condition or disability (a minimum of six months).

Please note the Shire's infirm parking permits are <u>not</u> a permit for ACROD parking bays. Once the civic centre ACROD parking bay is completed the Shire's infirm parking bays will be phased out due to safety and risk concerns associated with passing traffic on Hampton Street. The current infirm parking bays are to be reclassified as general parking bays with a 20 minute time limit and at the same time the 6 parking bays on Hampton Street in front of IGA will be reduced from a 2 hour parking limit to a one hour parking limit.

Bridgetown Shows Their Faces for People & Places Opening

A large and dynamic crowd descended on Bridgetown Pottery and The Rabbit Hole to celebrate the opening night of Bridgetown's favourite annual art exhibition and competition. The joyful crowd took in portraits and landscapes at Bridgetown Pottery, before meandering to The Rabbit Hole for the sculptures, photographs and awards.

A total of 96 exhibits completed the show in portrait, landscape, sculpture and photography categories. Artists from Bridgetown and beyond had spent months working on their works of art – and it showed. The standard of entries was high, making the judges' task of selecting a winner a difficult one.

Judges Caro Lunel (Bunbury Regional Art Gallery), Anna Czerkasow (Pemberton Arts Group) and Mark Grey-Smith (a sculptor with over 45 years experience) judged each category. Winners of the Best in Show prize each received \$1,000 and winners of the Youth Award each received \$200.

Many thanks go to the judges for providing their valuable time and professional insights in selecting the winners.

Now in the second year of the People & Places format, the exhibition welcomed some new sponsors. The generous financial support of the sponsors meant an increased artist prize pool was on offer, with Best in Show winners receiving \$1,000 each. People's Choice prize winners took home \$250 and each youth award winner received \$200. Many thanks go to each of the sponsors for backing Bridgetown's artistic community and our budding

young artists.

Unfortunately, due to a low number of youth entries in the Portrait a n d Landscape categories, youth winners were not



selected. However the sponsors of these categories have decided to use these prize funds to motivate and encourage more young artists to put themselves and their artwork "out there" and enter the exhibition next year. Stay tuned for an update in an upcoming edition of Insight.

Community Citizen of the Year

Senior Community Citizen of the Year (65 years or over)

Young Community Citizen of the Year (under 25 years)

Active Citizenship Award (community group or event)

Eligibility Criteria

- A person must first be nominated to be considered for the Awards
- · Nominees should reside or work principally within the local authority making the award
- Awards may be granted posthumously in recognition of recent achievements
- · Groups of people will not normally be eligible except when meeting the criteria for a community group
- A couple may be recognized in an individual category
- A person may receive an award on more than one occasion in recognition of their particularly outstanding community contribution or involvement in an alternative initiative
- Self-nominations are not accepted
- Individuals must be at least 16 years of age on 26 January, though younger nominees may be considered for exceptional contribution
- Unsuccessful nominees may be nominated in future years
- Sitting members of State, Federal and Local Government are not eligible
- Nominations must be apolitical in their nature
- · Nominees should not in any way bring the awards program or local government area into disrepute.

Nominations must be completed on-line with the Australia Day Council of WA at: https://www.citizenshipawards.com.au/nominate/

It is important that nominations include as much detail as possible to assist the Council in making its decision on the winners in each category. To assist this process, the on-line application does include an area where nominators are able to attach photos, word documents or pdf files.

Nominations will open on Sunday, 1 September and close on Thursday, 31 October 2019.

upon the valuation of the property, as determined by the Valuer-General and the rate in the dollar.

Within the Shire land is rated as either Unimproved Value (UV) or Gross Rental Value (GRV). The rating principles of the Local Government Act require rural land to be rated on its Unimproved Value (UV) and non-rural land is rated on its Gross Rental Value (GRV).

Note if property owners are of the view that the valuation attributed to their property is incorrect they can seek a review by the Valuer – General. Further information on this process can be obtained from Stephen Roberts or Darren Wilson at the Shire Office.

Emergency Services Levy (ESL) Increase

The Emergency Services Levy (ESL) appearing on your rates notice is an important contribution to assist our fire fighters, both in an employed and volunteer capacity, for our Fire and Emergency Services, Bush Fire Brigade and the State Emergency Service. This is not a Council charge, but is collected by local governments on behalf of the State Government.

Early Payment of Rates Incentive Prizes

Once again it is proposed to offer incentives for the early payment of rates. Property owners who pay their rates in full by 27 September 2019 are able to lodge an entry into a draw. The draw will be conducted by the Shire President after the closing date for early payment. The prize to be offered this year is \$600 in Community Cash Vouchers.

10. Waste Management

For many years Council has adopted the principle that waste management should be funded on a cost recovery basis. This means that all the expenses associated with waste management are funded by the kerbside rubbish collection charge, kerbside recycling collection charge, the Landfill Site Maintenance Charge plus other waste income such as recycling subsidies and tipping fees.

Council charges on all rateable properties a landfill rate under Section 66 of the Waste Avoidance and Resource Recovery Act 2007. This section of the Act allows a local government to impose on rateable land within its district. and cause to be collected, an annual rate for the purpose of providing for the proper performance of all or any of the waste services it provides. All rateable properties will be charged a minimum rate of \$195.00 with concessions for multiple properties applicable as per previous years. This minimum rate is an increase of

\$2 from 2018/19.

New capital works in waste management are installation of an emergency pumping system) and crushing of the inert waste stockpile at the waste site. A development plan is also to be prepared setting out the future development of the waste site.

Rehabilitation of the former Greenbushes liquid waste facility is to occur in 2019/20.

The Kerbside rubbish and recycling collection service areas remain unchanged and the relevant charges for households receiving these services are:

- Rubbish Collection Charge -\$79.00 (remains the same as 2018/19)
- Recycling Collection Charge -\$69.00 (decrease of \$2 from 2018/19)

The Shire of Bridgetown-Greenbushes is continuing to partner with the other 11 local governments of the south-west region in investigating potential regional waste initiatives. Contributions are being made by each local government based on a ratio linked to rates revenue and this contribution has been provided for in the budget.

11. Other

- Funds of \$15,915 (including \$15,000 carried forward from 2018/19) have been set aside for surveying of the proposed realignment of the Nelson Street/Hampton Street intersection and partial closure of Hester Street adjacent to the Repertory Theatre.
- Continuation as a member of the Warren Blackwood Alliance of Councils and funding of regional trails website and events website.
- Funding of \$45,320 towards the 2nd year operations of the Southern Forest Blackwood Valley Tourism Association.

- A wastewater dump point is being constructed in the railway carpark in Bridgetown at an estimated cost of \$56,000.
- Funding of \$5,000 to assist with preparation of a Local Health Plan.
- Funding, the majority of which is a carry forward from 2018/19 is provided for completion of the new Local Planning Strategy including a review of bush fire planning policy.
- Funding for progressive acquisition of land adjacent to Geegelup Brook.
- Funding has been allocated to progress the design and land acquisition for car parking proposals in the Bridgetown and Greenbushes town centres.
- Review directional signage to car parking.
- Funding has been carried forward from 2018/19 for the upgrade of the northern information bay in Bridgetown.
- An electrical capacity assessment of the Bridgetown Sportsground Precinct (encompassing sportsground buildings & infrastructure, Shire Depot and Incident Control Centre) is to be carried out in 2019/20 in order to determine capacity for additional electrical connections and/or development within the Precinct.

12. Loans

No new loans are proposed in the budget for 2019/20.

As at 1 July 2019 the Shire's loan liability was \$2,063,582 and under the 2019/20 budget this liability will decrease to \$1,810,366 at 30 June 2020.

How much will my rates go up?

The budget provides for an overall rate increase of 2.5%. However this does not mean that all properties will have a rate increase of that amount. The amount of rates attributed to a property is dependent

Walking the Dog

Dog exercise areas exist in designated zones. Please note that the Bridgetown Sports Ground and school ovals are not designated dog exercise areas. Regardless of where you are, your dog must be under your control at all times. Please remember to be responsible and pick up after your pooch so that public areas are kept clean and usable for the whole community. Maps showing dog exercise areas are available from Shire administration.

The Bridgetown Agricultural Show Grounds and the Bridgetown High School oval are not Shire-designated dog exercise areas, however the property managers allow community members to exercise dogs on their land. They do ask for dog owners to be respectful and use the waste bags provided to remove their dog's droppings and put them in the bin. These spaces are used for community events and for children to play in. Please use the space responsibly and clean up after your pet to ensure these spaces can remain available for all to use.






Dog attacks on livestock have been an ongoing issue in our community. Five separate incidents were reported to Rangers in July. Livestock attacks cause emotional distress and financial loss for stock owners. Dog owners are obligated to keep their animals safely confined to their property. Infringements and fencing orders may be imposed on owners whose dogs wander at large.

Other issues on the Rangers' radar include:

- Abandoned vehicles are unsightly and cause environmental hazards. Vehicles that are left in a public place in excess of 24 hours, or abandoned vehicles that are wrecks, may be impounded by Rangers. Impound fees apply and littering infringements may apply. Three abandoned vehicles were dealt with by Rangers in June/July
- Dumped animal carcasses should be responsibly disposed of to prevent the spread of disease and biosecurity hazards. Dumping carcasses in public places is against the law and can encourage predatory vermin into the area. Carcasses should be appropriately buried or incinerated.



Is Your Dog or Cat Registered?

Residents are reminded that dog and cat registrations are due annually on 1 November. There are 3 payment categories – "1 Year"; "3 Years" or "Lifetime" with concessions being available for eligible Pensioners.

It would be appreciated if pet owners could advise the Shire office if their registered dog or cat is deceased to enable the Shire's records to be updated.

- Ethel Street (asphalt overlay) between Spencer Street and Roe Street)
- Brockman Street (asphalt overlay)

- Doust Street (asphalt overlay) between Mattamattup Street and Ford Road)
- Kandalee Road (gravel sheeting and drainage works)
- Taylors Road (widening and aravel sheeting)
- Farrell Street (gravel sheet selected locations)
- Nelson Street (asphalt overlay) intersection with Thornbill Road)

Following on from reconstruction works completed last year second coat bitumen seals will be laid on Brockman Highway, Winnejup Road, Tweed Road and Glentulloch Road.

Also bridge works to the value of \$1,017,000 (fully externally funded) will occur on two bridges - one located on Donnelly Mill Road and the other on Winnejup Road.

3. Footpaths

Only a small footpath program is proposed in 2019/20. Steps are to be constructed at the western end of Campbell Street to provide a safe pedestrian connection with Allnutt Street and \$5,000 is allocated for disability access improvements.

construction Α drainage program valued at \$91,101 provides for drainage projects on the following roads:

- Huggett Place
- · Lakeview Crescent
- · Whittells Road
- Eedle Terrace
- · Dean Street & Apex Grove near intersection with Roe Street
- Claret Ash Drive
- Four Seasons Estate

5. Recreation

- Construction of the gym extension at the Bridgetown Leisure Centre.
- Installation of a chlorine auto shut down system at the aquatic centre.
- · Construction of a stage in Memorial Park. The estimated

- cost in the budget is \$150,000 with \$100,000 to be externally sourced.
- Staged replacement exercise equipment in Somme Creek Parklands.
- · Completion of the Warren Blackwood Stock Route, a regional bridle trail commencing in Bridgetown with two spur trails to Shannon and the Scott Coastal Plain south of Nannup. Note the Bridgetown-Shire of Greenbushes is proiect managing this project on the Warren behalf of Blackwood Alliance Councils hence all income (grants) and expenditure for the project is shown in the Shire's budget.
- Reconstruction of boardwalk below the caravan park.
- A parkland improvement strategy is to be prepared and this will guide future development and expenditures for parkland.
- Replacement of the travelling irrigator sprinkler used at the Bridgetown Sportsground.
- · Improvements to drainage in Memorial Park.

Fire Prevention/Emergency Management

- · ESL operating grant (DFES) for bush fire brigades increased from 2018/19 by 9.3% to \$180,000. A further \$11,336 has been received for additional bush fire insurance costs.
- · ESL operating grant (DFES) for the Bridgetown SES Brigade of \$21,570.
- · Changeover of the general rescue vehicle for the Bridgetown SES Brigade (ESL funded).
- · Four new light tankers for changeover of the existing appliance at the Hester Brook, Sunnyside, Wandillup and Winnejup Bush Fire Brigades (ESL funded).
- Replacement of the Shire owned bush fire support vehicle (Shire funded).
- ESL funding of \$242,600 for

construction of a new fire station for the Greenbushes Bush Fire Brigade with Shire funding of \$10,000 for earthworks.

- ESL funding of \$271,100 for construction of a new fire station for the Wandillup Bush Fire Brigade with Shire funding of \$10,000 for earthworks and \$5,000 for survey costs to create a new reserve for siting of the fire station.
- + 2019/20 is the 3rd year of funding under the State Government's Mitigation Activity Fund. The funds are to be received for mitigation activities on Shire controlled land. The actual amount of funding to be received is yet to be confirmed so a default sum of \$100,000 has been allowed for in the 2019/20 budget.

Community Services

- Funding for implementation of the Age Friendly Community Youth Plan, Friendly Community Plan and Access and Inclusion Plan via various programs, events and initiatives.
- Funding for the continuation of the summer evening outdoor film festival.
- Develop new ACROD parking bays in CBD to replace existing on-street infirm parking bays.
- Continuation Bridgetown Art Trail.

Governance and Administration

The 2019/20 Financial Assistance Grants (Commonwealth

Government) has been budgeted to be marginally higher (0.12% increase to \$1,204,716) than received in 2018/19. The Commonwealth Government did provide an advance payment of 50% therefore the budget only shows income for the remaining 50% over 4 quarterly payments. The 50% payment received towards the end of 2018/19 is contained in the

carry-forward surplus from 2018/19 to 2019/20.

- 2019/20 Local Road funding by Commonwealth Government Grants Commission been has estimated to be \$677,877 with a 50% payment received towards the end of 2018/19 contained in the carry-forward surplus from 2018/19 to 2019/20.
- · Commonwealth Government Roads to Recovery funding of \$423,704.
- · After being frozen for 4 successive years Councillor Allowances have been increased by 1.3%.
- · Council has appointed the Western Australian Electoral Commission to conduct the 2019 Local Government elections at an estimated cost of \$23,000.
- · Council will be engaging professional assistance for the purpose of lobbying State and Commonwealth governments infrastructure to fund considered necessary to accommodate the population growth associated with the Talison Lithium Expansion Project.
- · The total budgeted wages for 2019/20 is \$4,231,893 which is 2.14% greater than that allocated in the 2018/19 budget. This increase includes allocations for implementation of the new Workforce Plan. The \$4,231,893 of budgeted wages in 2019/20 equates to 90.66% of the total to be raised by rates in 2019/20, well within the target of 100% set by Council's current Workforce Plan.

Building 9. Major **Improvements**

The total expenditure proposed for building maintenance and capital improvements to buildings in 2019/20 is \$710,593 noting that this includes carryforward expenditure from 2018/19 of \$135,547 and an external contribution of \$60,000 to proposed works at the Greenbushes Golf Club.

In its budget deliberations Council decided it wished to focus the 2019/20 building maintenance and capital budget on 3 separate sites rather than trying to spread the budget evenly over the entire building inventory.

The 3 buildings selected for significant works (and funding) in 2019/20 are the Greenbushes Golf Club, Greenbushes Hall and Bridgetown Civic Centre. A summary of the works proposed for these 3 buildings are:

Greenbushes Golf Club

- Redevelopment demolish existing change rooms and install new transportable change rooms, repair roof beam, reclad western side of building (note the estimated cost of these works is \$120,000 and Talison Lithium has offered to fund 50% (\$60,000).
- Electrical repairs.

Greenbushes Hall

- Floor repairs replace stumps and level floor
- Window repairs
- New septic system and leach drains
- Replace roof screws

Bridgetown Civic Centre

- · Sand & oil town hall floor (follows floor repair work recently completed)
- Internal Painting
- · Replace lighting and fans in town hall
- Replace blinds in Lesser Hall
- Replace roof screws

Significant works proposed in 2019/20 for other Shire buildings includes:

- Replace septic tanks and leach drains at Greenbushes Sportsground (camp area);
- · Replace solar lights at Greenbushes Pool:
- · Replace automatic doors at Bridgetown Leisure Centre;
- Electrical repairs Greenbushes Roads Board office;
