Supporting a better beginning for you and your child

Better Beginnings was developed by the State Library of Western Australia as a family literacy program that supports parents as their child's first teacher. The program is based on strong partnerships with public libraries, local governments, health professionals and schools to:

- build awareness in the whole community of the value of reading and sharing stories with young children from birth;
- encourage and support parents in sharing books and activities that foster language and a love of reading with their young children; and
- promote the vital role of public libraries as community hubs that provide ongoing support to parents and caregivers in giving their children a love of reading.

Through Better Beginnings, we want every child to have the wonderful and very important experience of sharing books and stories with the adults in their life right from the time they are born. Better Beginnings supports parents in reading to children so that they build the early literacy skills they need to become good readers and succeed at school.

As a parent, reading to your young child is one of the most important things you can do to build the skills they need to learn to read and do well at school. The stronger a child's literacy skills – and the more they are encouraged to read – the better chance they have to explore new ideas and pursue their interests. The more a child reads the more options they have as they grow. Children learn to read from being read to and from watching their parents read. Better Beginnings aims to develop literacy skills in young children through fostering a love of books and language by:

- Introducing children to developmentally appropriate books and language activities through free books and reading packs to parents of newborns and children beginning kindergarten and preschool.
- Supporting parents as their child's most important teacher in modelling early literacy practices by providing interactive literacy and parenting information sessions.
- Raising awareness of the value and pleasure of reading. Linking families to the resources and services that libraries offer people of all ages.

Since its launch in 2005, Better Beginnings has reached over 250,000 families throughout Western Australia. Join us and become a Better Beginnings family today. Tidy Towns Sustainable Communities



Bridgetown was recently announced the 2019 winner of the Community Action and Wellbeing category of the State Tidy Towns Awards. Nominated for the community sesquicentenary celebrations that took place in 2018, Bridgetown was recognised for the collaborate effort involved in undertaking the large scale celebration designed to bring together the "past, present and future" of Bridgetown.

The nominated project was the Suite of Events delivered in 2018 to commemorate the 150th Anniversary of Bridgetown's Gazettal.

These events were created, co-ordinated and delivered by community members Pip Mills, Adrian Elder, Jenny Wright, Tessa Ditrach, Harold Thomas and Councillors Tony Pratico, Alan Wilson and Julia Boyle. Unfortunately none of the committee members were able to attend the Awards ceremony. The Shires' Executive Manager Community Services, Elizabeth Denniss, attended to accept the Award on their behalf.

There were six other entrants in this category and the judges' comments included:

A Community Group was formed to help Bridgetown celebrate 150 years since the town was gazetted. The celebration theme was "What it means to call Bridgetown home". The committee consisted of community members, Councillors and Shire staff.

The group planned a series of events to be held over the year, sought funding and technical expertise. Students were engaged in event generation. This was clearly a community-driven project bearing in mind sustainable outcomes such as building on the art trail, music and film festivals.

The Town Hall Revitalization Project

The Shire has recently submitted two grants, one with Lotterywest and another with the South West Development Commission in the latest Regional Economic Development funding program to revitalize the Town Hall and Civic Centre. The Shire has been recently notified by Lotterywest that the application for a sum of \$204,000 for renovations to the town hall was successful. The Shire is now waiting to hear from the South West Development Commission regarding funding before beginning to plan for the commencement of the Town Hall Revitalization project.

The intention of the Town Hall Revitalization project is to revive the heritage of the Bridgetown Town Hall and Civic Centre, restoring it to its former glory with the addition of modern technology and servicing. This will result in the development of a Civic Centre and performance venue capable of hosting a range of contemporary visual and performance art events, gallery style exhibitions and conference events. The revitalized Town Hall and Civic Centre will also provide a state of the art facility to comfortably fulfil community and civic uses whilst maintaining its historical importance and heritage values.

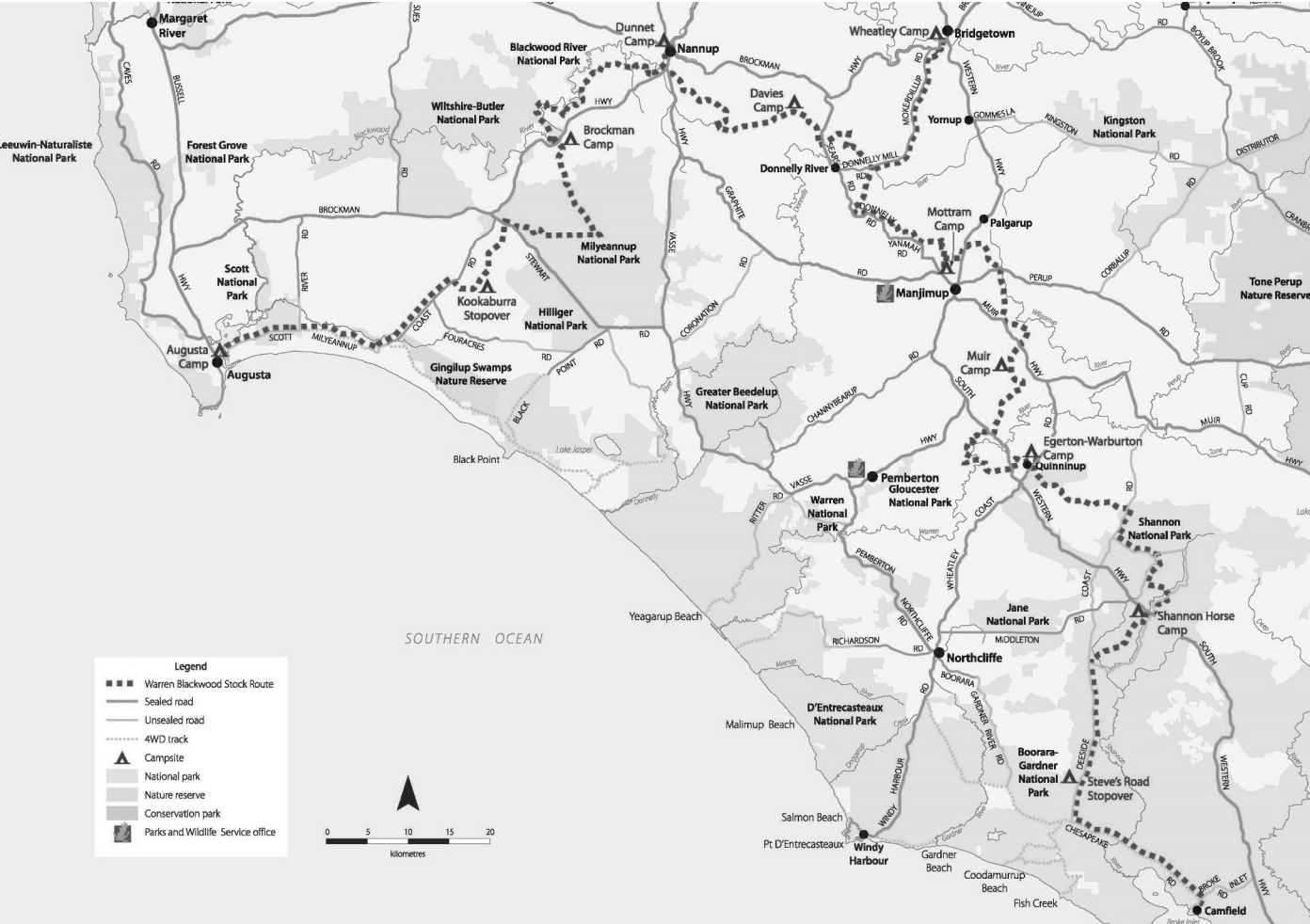

Warren Blackwood Stock Route

Possible Augusta Extension

The Shire of Bridgetown-Greenbushes is working closely with the Shire of Augusta-Margaret River on a proposal to extend the Warren Blackwood Stock Route from Scott River in the Shire of Nannup along Mileannup Coast Road and Scott River Road into East Augusta.

The proposed extension will include the installation of a campsite on Shire land in East Augusta. This proposal offers the perfect opportunity to complete the trail near the coast at Broke Inlet in Augusta and results in a 360km marked and signed bridle trail with 9 horse friendly camp sites (including shelter, horse yards, toilet and water) and 2 informal stop-overs. Interpretive signage is expected to be installed in late December 2019.

Shelter found at Visitor Centre for meaningful sculptures

The Shire's newest art acquisition is now on display in Bridgetown.

Constructed from historic roof shingles salvaged from Bridgetown's Bridgedale House, the two figures – titled Human Shelter, His and Hers – stand proudly in the window at the Visitor Centre.

After taking the opportunity to salvage half a ton of Westralian Sheoak roof shingles during Bridgedale's restoration, artist Tony Davis discovered they were in very sound condition considering they had spent 50 years under the sun and rain. Once redressed and sealed, the shingles were restored to their original beauty and became the basis of the sculptures.

An exploration on the theme of "shelter" the pair of figures, a male and a female, play on the tension between the softness of the human form and the static nature of the timber shingles. The two forms, in context with one another, retain the sublime dynamic of male and female despite the hard, static materials from which they are constructed.

Originally displayed at Sculpture by the Sea in Cottesloe back in 2011, the pieces were listed for auction at Donnelly Auction House earlier this year. The pieces were formerly owned by Sol Raiter, an esteemed

optometrist and private art collector.

The deceased estate auction was advertised and came to the attention of Pip Mills. Knowing the significance of the sculptures to Bridgetown's history, Pip knew the opportunity to acquire the pieces could not be lost. With just four days until the auction, a coordinated effort by Pip brought about a series of financial contributions. The then Shire President Tony Pratico agreed to commit the President's annual art acquisition budget of \$1,000 to the cause. Another patron of the arts donated \$2,000, then another patron came forward with \$1,000. A final donation of \$250 gave a total of \$4,250 to be bid on the sculptures – enabling the effort to make competitive bids on auction day.

On the day of the auction, Pip was bidding remotely from Bridgetown but had contacts in the room at the auction house. Other bidders had expressed interest in purchasing the pieces but, when they heard the Shire and community where the shingles originated was seeking to purchase them, all but one pulled out of the bidding.

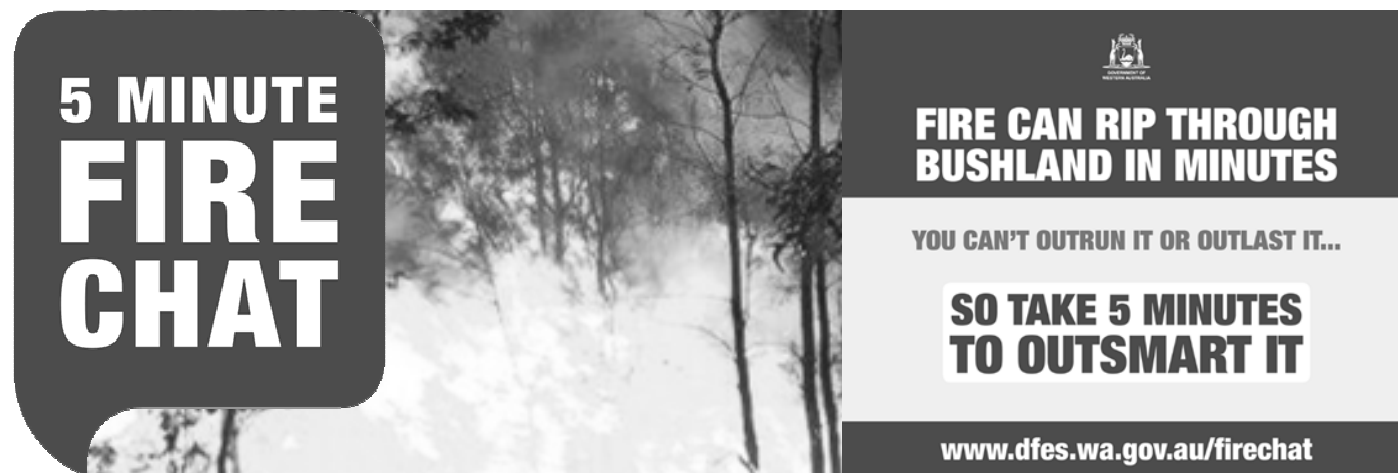
The auction began and bidding was on between the Bridgetown effort and the other interested party.

With the knowledge that Bridgetown's collaborative fundraising effort meant a limited budget, a third individual at the auction offered to continue bidding on Bridgetown's behalf if the price rose beyond the Bridgetown budget. Their intention was to donate the pieces to the community if successful. Fortunately, the collaborative effort led by Pip was effective and the shingles, in the new form, came home to Bridgetown.

After a brief stint in the window at Emporium, *Human Shelter, His and Hers* is now on display at the Visitor Centre for Bridgetown locals and visitors to enjoy.

Tony Davis is a sculptor, painter and furniture maker. Originally from Wyalkatchem, and having lived in Bridgetown for many years, Tony has had artworks displayed and commissioned all around the world. Tony lives in Gelorup with his wife Merle.

Having the **Fire Chat** is a great first step to protect your family, so you know what to do in case of an emergency and are able to enact your plan calmly and swiftly.

HEAT NO OBSTACLE FOR YOUTH LEADERSHIP TEAM

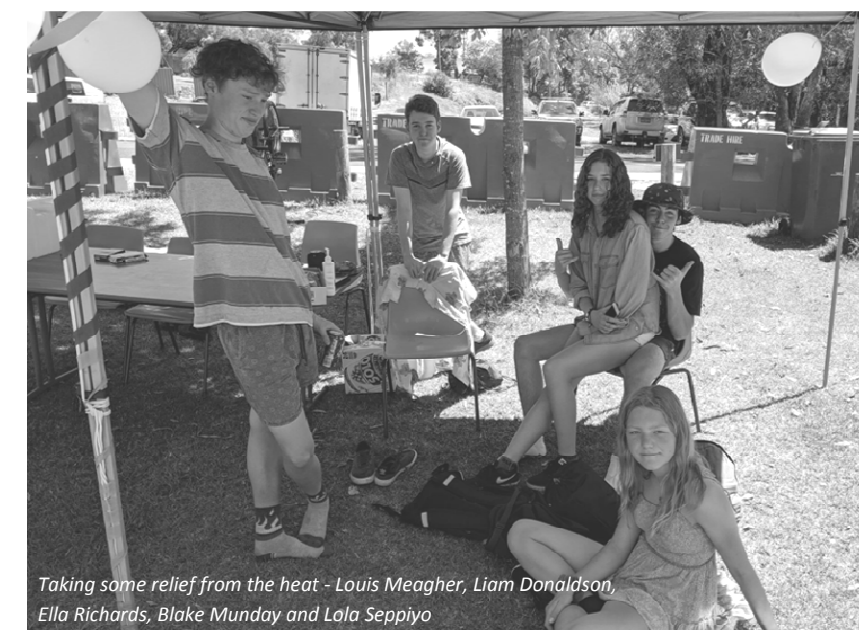

Because the survey information is important for the Leadership Team to help plan to meet the needs of young people in the future, surveys have also been provided to Bridgetown High School to complete.

ACTIVELY SEEKING STATE GOVERNMENT SUPPORT

With the growth of the Talison lithium mine in Greenbushes continuing over coming years, the Shire has prepared a growth strategy to maximise the opportunities presented by the mine's recent and projected expansion. The strategy contains key projects identified by the community over recent years as being highly valuable - and necessary - to improve and enhance quality of life in both Bridgetown and Greenbushes.

We are actively lobbying the State Government to commit to ensure continued prosperity and liveability for the people in the Shire, as well promoting greater tourism and local business investment by providing funding to progress key projects from the growth strategy.

These key projects have been consistently identified in community consultation over the past 4 – 5 years through a variety of forums and are reflected in the Shire's Strategic Community Plan and Corporate Business Plan.

The growth strategy is a succinct document which has 4 primary development categories that align to population growth associated with the mine expansion. These are:

1. Economic development
2. Improving opportunities for our youth and lifestyle
3. Preserving our heritage and boosting tourism
4. Improving safety and supporting industry

Specific projects within these categories include the development of a light industrial area; redevelopment of the Blackwood River Foreshore, Greenbushes Recreation Precinct and Bridgetown Youth Precinct; restoration of the Greenbushes and Bridgetown Railway stations; revitalization of the Bridgetown Town Hall; and CBD parking and safety enhancements in both Greenbushes and Bridgetown.

Because these projects are already identified within the Shire's Corporate Business Plan, staff continue to progress the planning stages and are actively seeking grant funding. Lotterywest recently approved a \$204,000 grant to assist with the costs associated with the Bridgetown Town Hall refurbishment. Lobbying of relevant State Government Ministers will continue leading into the 2020-2021 State budget preparation.
